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



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About this Book

The 7th Grade Vocabulary and Spelling Practice Workbook is a comprehensive tool for students looking to enhance their language skills. The book features a graduated structure that guides students through the effective use of vocabulary. Each section includes definitions of the target words with examples, exploration of their usage, writing in context activities, and a variety of spelling activities. The spelling activities include identifying tricky letter positioning, indicating syllables, and more. To ensure students can self-check their work, answers with explanations are provided after each practice activity. At the end of the book, there are seven comprehensive tests, complete with scores, and a score interpretation table, to allow students to assess their overall performance. This book is an ideal resource for students of seventh grade, providing a structured and enjoyable approach to vocabulary and spelling development.

I hope that this book will aid you in advancing your mastery of vocabulary and spelling.

Introduction

This book contains sixteen intensive lessons, divided into separate sections, focusing on vocabulary and spelling practice.

In the first section 'Let's get the Feeling of the Word,' students are introduced to twelve target words. This section encourages the student to understand the connotations of each target word and to identify its positive, negative, or neutral meaning. This practice forms the foundation for more targeted activities which follow in the successive lessons. This is followed by the definitions section with example sentences for each target word.

In the successive lessons the target words are grouped into two groups. Each group of six target words has two lessons, one focusing on vocabulary activities and the other focusing on spelling practice. This means that every set of twelve target words has four lessons each, with the final lesson being a consolidation practice of all twelve words. The sixteen lessons target in depth, forty-eight words, for the seventh grader to master.

The Lessons

Each group of four lessons targets the twelve words repeatedly in different ways, using a variation of practice activities, with the aim to engage the student more and to reduce boredom as much as possible. At the end of each group of four lessons, there is a memory checkpoint page which allows the student to track their progress and to note the words which still need to be worked on. On completing all the lessons, there is a final test section with scores and a score interpretation table, which gives a good indication of the student's overall performance and degree of knowledge. The score interpretation table also contains recommendations for further study, depending on the final score achieved.

Each vocabulary lesson contains two sections: (i) Let's Explore the Use of the Word, and (ii) Writing in Context. This is followed by the spelling lesson which contains a drilling activity and two or more spelling activities. This makes the focus on the target words intensive, as the student will be using them in several varied activities. Every set of activities is followed by checkpoints, answers and important points to note.

How to Use this Book

The best way to use this book is to follow the vocabulary and the spelling lessons successively because the aim of this book is that the student definitively internalizes, into their vocabulary repertoire, all the targeted forty-eight words. However, this book is versatile enough to allow the selection of lessons to support vocabulary and spelling work already completed in school or homeschool.




Best Answer	Why not?	Connotation
Authentic - Original	'accurate' - because it refers to something as being exact. A painting may be an accurate (exact) copy of the original painting, but not the original (and therefore, not authentic).	Positive or neutral but not negative.
Bystanders - Onlookers	'eyewitnesses' - because it usually refers to people who have seen something unusual or criminal, and they report it to the authorities (police officer or court).	Neither positive, nor negative, but neutral.
Customary - Conventional	'standard' - this word is related to 'customary' but does not have the same meaning. 'Standard' refers to a criterion which is generally accepted by everyone. A standard can be established by a rule or a law and also by a consistent practice such as custom.	Neither positive, nor negative, but neutral.
	Consider: The standard height of a door is 80 inches.
